## MY STORY IN CHINA



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The idea to further my studies after completion of my undergraduate degree was not a difficult decision to make as my father had always encouraged me to do so. I must confess that, in all my searches for institutions to pursue higher education, I had not considered China as my destination for further studies. An uncle of mine, a current student of Jiangsu University, after seeing my undergraduate results, admonished me to apply to JSU. Though I was sceptical at first, I decided to give it a try. Within 2 weeks, I received an email. In that email was my congratulatory message and acceptance into JSU. One could imagine the joy with which I received the news. Preparations were made for my VISA applications and on Saturday, 10<sup>th</sup> March, 2018, I boarded an Ethiopian plane from the Kotoka International Airport on what would be my first International flight out of my country, Ghana to China. After 19 nerve cracking hours, we finally touched down at the Shanghai Pudong airport.

My first impression of China was how vast the country was and how security conscious the officials were. I was met by my uncle at the airport and we took a bus to the train station. It was obvious I couldn't hide my amazement as I was still adjusting to the sight of high-rise buildings and the amazing road infrastructure. The first lesson I would learn in China was never to miss the train. Amidst the heavy luggage, we had to literally run to board the train as that was the last train from Shanghai to Zhenjiang. The train station was filled with people, some looking at us as we rushed for the train. On arriving in Zhenjiang, we took a taxi to campus. That night, I was introduced to Chinese food at a restaurant outside the library gate. The food is popularly called 'cocking' amongst international students. It's basically rice and chicken soup. I really enjoyed it.

In the subsequent weeks, I joined other international students for campus registration. I was amazed by how big the campus was. I used to think that I would never fully tour the entire campus (well, I still haven't). I was determined to study the Chinese language and make as many Chinese friends as I could. Interestingly enough, the first Chinese friend I made was a China Unicom vendor. I made friends with her when I purchased my China Unicom SIM card. Camille (her English name) was a very kind and patient woman. Despite her work, she had time for me anytime I passed by her office. Though she wasn't that fluent in English, she was always ready to assist me. Through our friendship, I got to learn some Chinese words and also know more about her personal life. She made me appreciate the good character traits of the Chinese people. I must confess that Chinese are one of the most helpful people you will ever come across. Students, lecturers and even the ordinary folks in the city are always ready to help you at the expense of their comfort. My Chinese laoshi, Weiwei, was also one of the first Chinese I interacted with. She was open and also down to earth. As we were the first batch of international students she was lecturing, she was as excited as

we were. Her devotion to teach us the Chinese language and help us improve was incredible. I could send her any Chinese text any time of the day and she would be willing to help me understand it.






Through her help, I met a Chinese friend, Aaron, who though was an undergraduate student, always had

I also joined a group of Chinese students to learn some traditions of the Chinese people, such as the paper cutting, tea making, traditional Chinese dance and also playing of the 古筝, guzheng. In all I learnt of the value Chinese people placed on tradition and I was really impressed by this.





Another transformational factor in my life since I came to China was the opportunity the Overseas Education College (OEC) through Olive Media gave me. As a self-taught graphic designer back home in Ghana, I wondered how I could develop the talent once I got to China but with the help of Olive Media and the opportunity to be one of the designers for the Olive Newsletter, I have advanced in my designing ability



at an exponential rate. This opportunity has exposed me to a lot of Chinese designing trends and design principles.

I feel it necessary to mention one key thing I noticed about JSU and China as a whole which is that the misconceptions about the country are far from true. I was amazed by the level of technology being used in the country. From WeChat to Alipay to electronic vehicles to high speed

trains, in fact a whole lot. Since I am tech savvy, I quickly learnt a lot of stuffs since I was determined to make good use of the technology in the country and also learn as much as I could. The philosophy I learnt

Although I occasionally face challenges especially with regards to the language barrier, I'm always relieved knowing well that any of my Chinese friends will be readily available to help. In all, coming to China has granted me an opportunity to view Chinese people in a positive light and also motivated me to strive for excellence in whatever I do. I now go anywhere confidently knowing very well that I can rely on any Chinese person to help me with any issue I may face.
